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SAIMA Cricket team remains invincible in T-25!

I stand tall as a proud captain of SAIMA cricket team again in year 2016, this time beating South Australian Sri-Lankan Doctors Association (SASDA) in T 25 over format. Last year after beating PMASA 3 times consecutively pressure was on us. SASDA won against PMASA as well. So this was a kind of mini-subcontinental trophy to be won.

It was not a typical October morning, with dew still fresh on the outfield (rains from 2 days ago) and temperatures in mid 10's. SASDA won the toss and elected to bowl first. A great opening knock by Shreyas and Ranjan meant SASDA bowlers couldn't get early breakthroughs and SAIMA was 59 not out at the end of 11 overs. Shreyas was batting exceptionally punishing loose deliveries with spectacular cover drives and taking some calculated risks, hitting over the infield. He was unfortunate and got out just short of 50 (43). Outfield was heavy and it was difficult to score boundaries after the ball got a bit older and the run rate was kept up by good singles and doubles by Ranjan, Sunny. Sunny looked in good nick but unfortunately got out for 20 before he could get into scoring shots. Having quite a few wickets in hand it was time to up the anti and Mitesh was sent up the order. He got going with a spectacular six over midwicket and there was no looking back. He had very good partnerships with Harsh and SAIMA ended up scoring 153 runs in 25 overs; highest so far.

It was a challenging total and a nervous lunch for many fans. Olive Green kitchen, Belair provided delicious Paav-Bhaaji and yummy chicken to fill up those with nervous stomachs. We expected that it will go down to the wire and it did!

SASDA had a steady start scoring at 5 runs an over. Bowling changes with spinners Sunny and Shreyas seem to be less effective as the outfield had dried and boundaries were easy to score. It was difficult to score to medium pace when Ravi and me keeping neat n tidy line and length. In the middle overs with some tight bowling we got a couple of wickets and asking run rate climbed up to more than 8 and over. Sanjeev Mendis played brilliant strokes and scored half century for SASDA and his wicket (caught and bowled by Mitesh) was key in changing the paradigm of the match. Priyantha steadied the innings scoring 26 but fell to Subodh (LBW) and suddenly the game turned with SAIMA looking favourites with runs on board.

The last over of the game had SASDA needing 9 runs a gettable score with 4 wickets in hand. Harsh's line and length was impeccable and SASDA struggled to connect bat to ball. Ultimately, SAIMA won by 2 runs. Swapnil's (Bobby) fielding was outstanding with a spectacular high catch on long on boundary. Mitesh, Harsh and myself got 2 wickets each. For his all round performance with ball and bat Mitesh got man of the match from SAIMA side and Sanjeev from SASDA side.

It was a great nail biting finish and a great start to outdoor cricket season. SAIMA team took on a seasoned club team from Adelaide Warriors cricket Club the following weekend and had victory again scoring 172 runs and winning by 34 runs, getting opponents all out. 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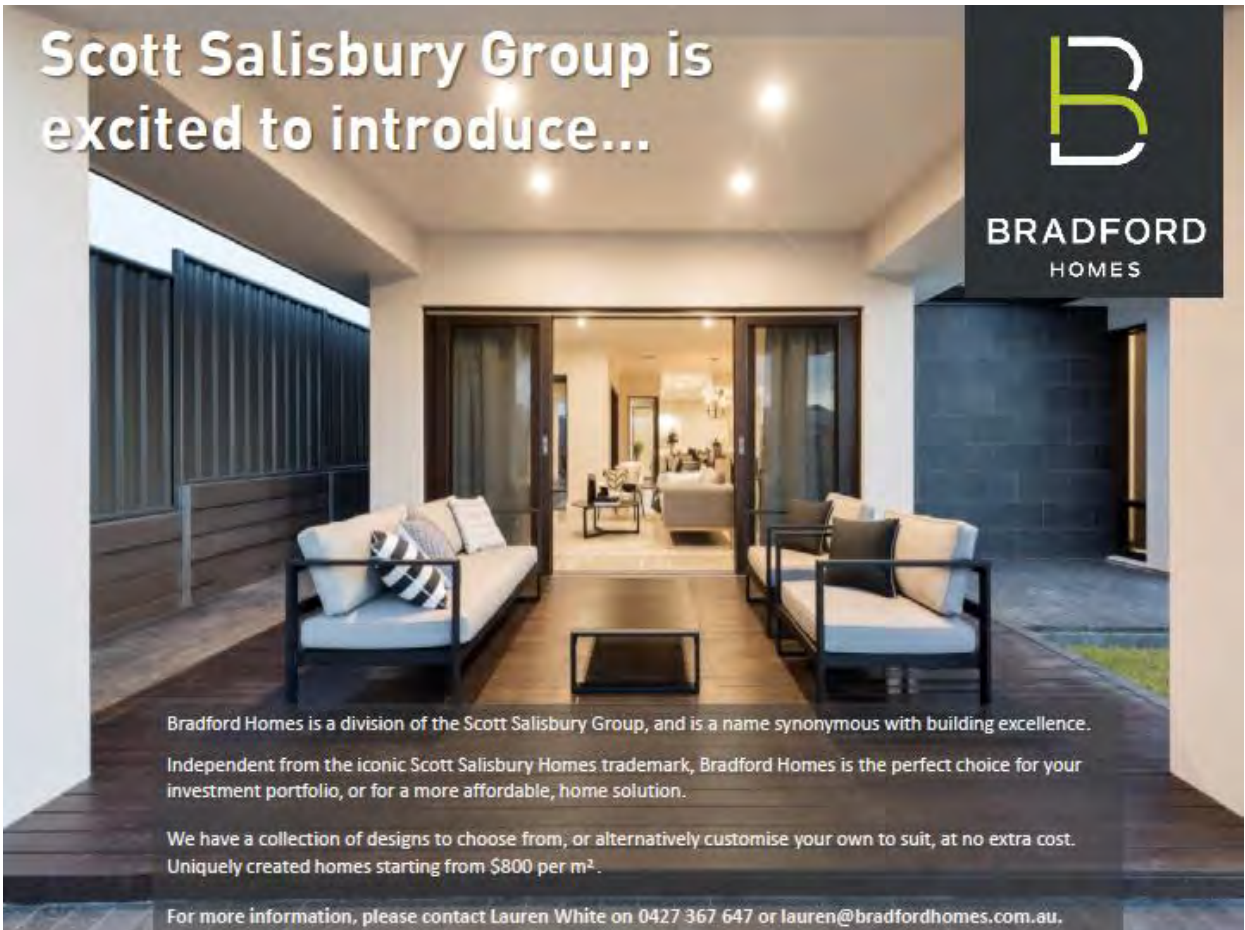
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SAIMA Inaugural Women's Event 18th Feb 2017 – by Dr Preetam Ganu

I feel a sense of pride and joy to write about the first ever SAIMA Women's Event held in February 2017. Before I continue it would be unjust not to share with you the efforts and preparations of the team in the months leading up to the event.

There is no doubt that women in SAIMA are great at multi-tasking and we have supported many SAIMA activities over the years. From organising the Gala Dinner kids' choir, performing a dance routine, cheering for the cricket team, teaching medical students or conducting a CME, we were always there when called upon to support SAIMA.

At the September 2016 AGM, Dr Arvind Sehgal mentioned in his presidential report of the lack of active involvement of women in SAIMA, and that there have been no women on the SAIMA committee for a few years. He expressed his hope that women from within the SAIMA organisation would consider taking a more active role. This led me to speak with my friends, discuss different ideas, look at my commitments and finally, email Dr Arvind Sehgal and the SAIMA committee with an offer to do something for Women in SAIMA. I wish to thank SAIMA committee who wholeheartedly supported this idea. They all wanted women to feel a valued part of the SAIMA family and expressed this by supporting the event.

As the first ever women's event, we were unsure of the response and number of attendees. Arya restaurant was chosen as a central venue, plus everyone loves their food! The format was simple: an informal Bollywood theme, women's only event with fun games, delicious food and dance! Now who doesn't like that!

All women from the SAIMA family were invited to join, including Doctors, Allied Health Professionals, mothers, daughters, friends and colleagues. An event like this requires much organisation and an awesome team of volunteers. Everyone I asked joined with enthusiasm. Dr Suman Murthy took the responsibility of creating flyers and advertising. Dr Anu Kochar, Dr Sonali Meena, Dr Amita Ingole, and Dr Ashlesha Vaidya took the responsibility for games and prizes.

Dr. Shipa Prasan and Dr. Anu Kochar organised the venue and menu. Dr. Radhika Dara, Dr. Lakshmi Nath, Dr Aparna Narsing and Dr Juthika Choudhury helped to gather more information about SAIMA and other background work. Dr. Deepti Singhal helped to organise drinks. Dr. Swati Sinkar organised the DJ and joined me as the MC. Everyone in the team gave their valuable time while juggling work, kids and family. I cannot thank enough Tracey DiBartolo, SAIMA Secretariat for her unlimited support with emails, memberships, communications and reminders. We would be lost without her.

Bookings opened and the response was beyond our expectations! We had estimated 35-40 women, but the event was sold out within a few days with 70 tickets pre-booked! Many businesses and organisations contacted me offering sponsorship, but due to limited space and time, a decision was made to decline and consider sponsorship next time.

Attendees arrived and very soon the room was filled with laughter, non-stop chatting, smiling and cheerful faces and gorgeous outfits everywhere. The room was full of talented people; a Director of Medical services for Country Health SA, a Mrs World 2015 participant, a share trader, a volunteer at the

I am sure we can improve for future events. It was only first step to building a platform for the future. It has been suggested to hold an annual Women’s event, conduct a Sports day or organise a picnic.

There is also evidence supporting how such activities help foster our community and health. No medical article is complete without a reference to a peer reviewed journal: “Often as a society, we are good at building fences. But there is a problem. As human beings we need each other. Some people

even believe we are created for relationships. Research suggests that social isolation is the cause of many illnesses. Belonging to a social network of communication and mutual obligation makes people feel cared for, loved, esteemed and valued. This has a powerful protective effect on health” (Wilkinson & Marmot, 2003, cited in VicHealth 2005, p. 3).

I am confident that the seed we sowed with this event, will grow into a big tree of shared thoughts and help our society and one day bear the fruit of SAIMA Women as leaders in creating a new, and healthier society of deep sharing and togetherness.

I take this opportunity to again thank all who made this event possible, to name a few, the SAIMA committee, all the planning team and those who attended, and I promise that there will be more to come. Stay tuned!



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General Practitioner Profile - Dr Rajan Anand



Dr Rajan Anand is a General practitioner with a special interest in Orthopaedics, Geriatrics and Palliative Care. Rajan currently works at Primary Old Port Road Medical and Dental, Royal Park and also attends to residents in several nursing homes.

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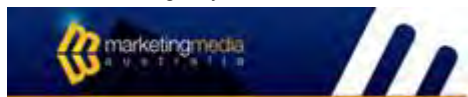
